#### Soldiers watching from the trenches, families stuck in war-torn regions: Ukraine battle adversity to qualify for Euro 2024

Mykhailo Mudryk went down on his knees and prayed after the full-time whistle. Around the Ukraine winger, a sea of yellow and blue exploded in ecstasy.

At 'home' in Wroclaw, Poland, the war-torn country defeated Iceland to qualify for the Euro 2024, their first major tournament since Russia invaded the country in 2022. They came very close to qualifying for the World Cup in Qatar two years ago. Back then, Wales crushed their dream at the last minute, leaving the players in tears.

As the thousands of Ukrainians celebrated the historic win inside the stadium in Poland, millions more at home, who have had very little to cheer about since the invasion, got a rare reason to rejoice amid a war.

Even the country's president, Volodymyr Zelensky, joined in. "Thank you, guys! Thank you, team! For significant emotions for the entire country," he wrote on social media platform X, formerly Twitter. "For the important victory and making it to EURO. For proving once again: whenever Ukrainians face difficulties but do not



Ukrainians certainly win. In times, when the enemy tries to destroy us, we demonstrate every day that Ukrainians are and will be. Ukraine is, and will be! Thank you for the victory! Glory to Ukraine!"

Indeed, the players from Ukraine have been defiant in the face of adversity. That feeling culminated on the football turf with the team winning their last two matches from losing positions. Against Iceland and Bosnia and Herzegovina, they were losing by a

goal before they mustered a comeback to win both matches 2-1 to punch their tickets to Germany.

According to the Athletic, after the victory against Iceland, the players led by captain Oleksandr Zinchenko led his team around the pitch as the crowd chanted "Z-S-U! Z-S-U! Z-S-U!" which stood for 'Zbronyi Syly Ukrainy' the Armed Forces of Ukraine.

The tribute was for the forces who were seen on social media watching the match through tiny TV screens, cooped up in metal huts as the war rages on out-

used the moment to ensure the crisis did not fade from public consciousness.

"It will be so important. All the world is going to watch this competition. It's an unreal opportunity to show how good we are as a team and how good it is to be Ukrainian," Zinchenko said as quoted by the Guardian. Ukraine coach Serhiy Rebrov added: "This win is for our people, for the soldiers who are protecting our freedom."

Midfielder Georgiy Sudakov called for more international support for his country. "Look at what has happened in Ukraine in the last days, the last weeks. The drones, the missiles, the bombs that arrive at different cities. It's incredible. That's why we need support," Sudakov was also quoted by the Guardian.

According to several reports, Ukraine's vice-captain Stepanenko has several family members in the Donetsk region which is still under Russian control while fullback Oleksandr Karavayev has family in Kherson which was under Russian occupation for several months before

Meanwhile, bronze medallist MC Mary Kom was named as India's chef de mission for Paris 2024 while Winter Olympian Shiva Keshavan has been appointed as the Deputy Chef de Mission for Paris 2024.

Andhra Cricket Association (ACA) has served a show cause notice to Hanuma Vihari, in response to the former Andhra skipper pointing out political interferences in the association that led to his ousting as the captain

in the recently concluded Ranji Trophy season. "Yes, we have served him a show-cause notice and we are awaiting his reply," an ACA official told. "This is just to find what made him react the way he did last month. He has not reached out

grievances. After all, we value Vihari and his contributions to the growth of state cricket as he has played a big part in Andhra going up in the ranks

in domestic cricket.'

ACA's notice comes a month after Vihari had taken to his social media to announce that he will "never play for Andhra again", alleging that he was forced to step down from his role as captain. "I was captain in the first game against Bengal, and during the game, I shouted at 17th player, and he complained to his dad (who is a politician)," Vihari wrote. "His dad in return asked the association to take action against me. Although we chased 410 against last year's finalists Bengal [for a firstinnings lead], I was asked to resign from captaincy without any fault of mine.

Igor Stimac, a compulsive crowd-pleaser, wouldn't have seen it coming.

Minutes after India sunk to a new low following the 2-1 loss to Afghanistan in the 2026 World Cup and 2027 Asian Cup joint qualifier, hundreds of fans surrounded the team bus as the players and coach exited the stadium, chanting 'Stimac out!' amidst a din of boos. The man who pulls no punches is now Indian football's favourite punching bag.

Indeed, his volte-faces, which would embarrass even a seasoned politician, constantly shifting goalposts, giving lame excuses and the tendency to throw everyone else under the bus give a glimpse into the mind of a football manager who seems bereft of ideas or a bigger vision. But as things stand, Stimac isn't the only problem confronting Indian football. India can still finish second in their group and make the cut, for the first time, for the third round of World Cup qualifiers. Though historic, it might not necessarily be a good thing. It will only paper over the cracks and give the administrators at Football House a false sense of achievement despite deep structural problems.

Stimac's tenure will be remembered for his frequent Cruyff turns with his actions and statements as per convenience. But in doing so, he also routinely flung a truth bomb or two, showing Indian football the mirror. No one could have

When Kwena Maphaka, playing his first IPL match vas smashed for 20 runs in his second over by Travis Head, Mumbai Indians captain Hardik Pandya had only one choice in his hand.

At that point, Maphaka had bowled two and Hardik simself had bowled one with SRH racing to 40/0.

Enter, Jasprit Bumrah. Six balls, one two, two dots and hree singles. SRH four overs 45/0, a regular powerplay score on most batting pitches. The result: Hardik got the wicket of Mayank Agarwal on the first delivery of the next over, giving his team a breather. At least that is what the MI captain would have thought. But Head didn't. Shor ball, dispatched, full toss, driven down and length, mus cled through the off-side — three fours in as many balls and SRH were back on track.

And it has, to an extent, worked for them as well.

India went down 1-2 against the resolute Afghans on Tuesday night, marking an embarrassing day for the sport in the country The home team's solitary goal came from a penalty conversion by veteran striker Sunil Chhetri.

"We remained confident even when we were trailing. To be nonest, we also could have won the earlier match. We were always the dominant side in the match," Westwood said referring to the first leg clash in Abha, Saudi Arabia which ended in a goalless draw.

"It was unlucky at 0-0 in the last game. We could have wor that if we took our chances. I was not under pressure at 1-0 at half-time because I knew we would score. I never felt pressured because I always believed in the boys and I am glad we got the esult." he added.

Rahmat Akbari (71') and Sharif Mukhammad (88') scored for the Afghans last night, giving the side a victory that would be

cherished for a long time. Westwood said that being the coach of Afghanistan presents several logistical challenges as players are scattered across at least 16 countries, who have to be brought together for training

## Spain Masters: For PV Sindhu, Madrid offers another chance to end a long title wait on badminton's World Tour

Before their Swiss Open campaigns began last week, PV Sindhu and Carolina Marin each shared the same photo of catching up at St Jakobshalle in Basel. "We wage war every time we play, but off the court, the smiles and friendships persist, as they always should," Sindhu's caption "Always wonderful to cross paths with you, dear friend!" "Friendship never ends,

hope to see you on court this week," Marin's post said.

Indeed a semifinal meeting between the two old-time frenemies appeared on the cards but Sindhu's week was ended early by Japanese teenage sensation Tomoka Miyazaki. Marin, on the other hand, went on to make it two titles in as many weeks, to follow up her superb run at the All England.

A potential reunion in front of her fans against Sindhu in the final was a possibility, but as a result of two taxing weeks, top seed Marin decided to pull



out of her home event in Madrid. That leaves Sindhu as the effective top seed at the Spain Masters Super 300. The Indian started off with a comfortable 21-16 21-12 win on Wednesday against Wen Yu Zhang of Canada, which took only 30 minutes. Sindhu began slowly in a match that wasn't of the highest quality. Both players were making errors and clean winners were few

and far between. But post the

mid-game interval, Sindhu started to find a better tempo, and somewhat cleaned up her game. When she starts hitting crosscourt whipped smashes from the forehand corner, it is usually a sign she is feeling good on court. That started happening a bit more often towards the back end of the opener as she pushed on the pedal from 14-14. The Canadian youngster, ranked 49 in the world, struggled with

pulling ahead in the second game, her challenge fizzled out. It marked a solid enough beginning for Sindhu in a week where she stands a real chance of going the distance. Not including the gold she won at the Asia Team Championships earlier this year in Malaysia, Sindhu hasn't reached a final since doing so at this very tournament last vear. As was the case in 2023, Madrid once again offers Sindhu the best opportunity to end a mini-title drought that stretches back to the Birmingham Commonwealth Games in 2022, where she suffered the first of her two recent significant injuries. On the World Tour, the last title she won was just before the CWG, at the 2022 Singapore Open.

Apart from Marin, the Fab Four - An Se Young, Chen Yufei, Tai Tzu-Ying and Akane Yamaguchi - have all skipped
